# WASHINGTON STATE PARKS EXPERIENCE CALIFORNIA PROBLEMS

Junior Past President Herman Schlerf represented the California Department of Parks and Recreation at the Washington State Recreation and Park Association Conference November 3, 4 and 5 in Pasco, Washington.

Schlerf spoke to a WRPA group about enforcement of Park Rules and Regulations and Park Ranger training programs and trends in the California State Park System.

He also had the opportunity to attend several sessions presented by Dr. Joseph Bannon, Head of the Department of Leisure Studies at the University of Illinois. Some of the topics covered by Dr. Bannon included "Problem Solving in Recreation and Parks", "Managing Human Resources", and "Decision Making for Effective Managers".

In addition, Schlerf had the opportunity to share park experiences and exchange information with his host, Ange Taylor, Region III Supervisor for the Washington State Park System.

During discussions with Mr. Taylor and while attending a Washington State Legislative Seminar session, Schlerf noted trends in the Washington State Park System that parallel those of the California State Park System in many areas. For example, operating costs are growing out of proportion

to user fee revenues; and vandalism and other crimes are on the increase requiring more time and responsibility on the part of Park Rangers and Managers.

It was also interesting to note that the Washington State Park System is studying the development of a camping reservation system.


### RANGER II CINDY SULENES INVITES COMMENT

An item of interest to CSPRA women rangers, Mr Schlerf met Washington State Park Ranger II Cindy Sulenes and discussed female ranger career opportunities in the California State Park System.

Ranger Sulenes was sent the names of several California women Rangers with whom she plans to communicate. Mr. Taylor also talked about an informal conference of state park personnel from several western states. Two or three years ago members of the Northwestern States State Park Systems met on an informal basis to discuss mutual concerns. Each year the number of participants has grown.

In the Fall of 1977 this group plans to meet in Idaho with invitations extended to state park systems of the six or seven Western states. It would be of great interest and benefit for CSPRA to send a representative to this conference to exchange professional thoughts. Mr. Taylor will send CSPRA details of the conference as soon as they are available.
