New Transfer Policy CSPRA Invited To 'Meet & Confer'

President McCall and Vice President Verardo met and conferred on the new proposed DPR transfer policy. Present at the session were Al Ross, Human Resources Section Chief; Jerry Johnson, Personnel Utilization Unit Supervisor and Dorothy Benjamin, Affirmative Action Unit Supervisor.

The new policy is a radical departure from the old policy and incorporates as its basic concept the idea CSPRA has proposed for several years, that vacancies be advertised. While McCall and Verardo suggested several modifications such as retention of the Career Development Plan, it was felt the new policy should be given a chance.

Al Ross stressed the policy, which still requires the Director's approval, would not be "cast in concrete" and modifications would be made if any portions prove difficult.

All parties were pleased that such a meeting took place prior to implementation of a major field policy and CSPRA hopes to continue its close communication with this administration.

\$1000 REWARD FOR TREE CUTTERS

A \$1000 reward is being offered by the California State Park Rangers Association for information leading to the apprehension of the person(s) cutting the Redwoods in the Northern California Redwood Parks.

The acts of those who would defile these few redwoods under park protection must be stopped for it strikes at the heart of what we stand for. CSPRA condemns this action and hopes a reward will aid in obtaining knowledge of the violators whereabouts.

The Board recently met in Santa Rosa for its winter meeting. We met at the 1978 G.E.C. site and were favorably impressed. The Sheraton Tropicana is a first rate hotel and convention complex. Hopefully we'll see you there in March.

One of the items on the Board's meeting agenda was an update on the **Environmental Career Opportunities** class which originated in Pittsburg through the very capable and dedicated efforts of Steve Kahn. The program has now expanded into the Bay Area. Essentially the program takes the State Park System to high school age kids in the inner city. His efforts are producing young people who have excellent potential as park Steve's program is employees. probably the most positive action the Department has taken toward meeting our Affirmative Action Goals. He's going into the minority community and taking the park experience to the young people of that community. I've talked to many people about the recruitment efforts we made for the last Trainee exam. Nearly everyone I talked to, recruitors, personnel board representatives, and applicants, all said our efforts needed to be aimed at lower age levels. By the time these people

reach the point of graduation they have set their direction. Because they are not aware of career opportunities in parks, they have generally set their direction toward some other career. Steve is definitely on the right track. He needs our help though. His kids need work experience in parks. As you Managers and supervising Rangers are seeking seasonal employees, keep Steve in mind. I hope that everything you wish for becomes yours in 1978.

We'll see you in Santa Rosa in March.

FEATURED OPINION

CSPRA & SB 839

By now most of you have heard of SB 839, the State Employer-Employee Relations Act. You have undoubtedly also heard the pros and cons of the bill offered by various groups and realize some of the potential problems with the bill, not the least of which is the loss of payroll deduction for all employee representation organizations other than the one that wins the representation election. Professional organization under SB 839 will be able to continue payroll deduction. Another problem for CSPRA posed by the bill is that our membership would split three ways. Rank and file, supervisory and management employees have differing rights under the bill. Rank and file can meet and confer on employee matters, supervisors can meet and confer but not represent rank and file, and management employees cannot meet and confer. In addition. maintenance and visitor services would be in different units for representation purposes.

Thus CSPRA is faced with several difficult choices: (1) it can try to win sole representation for employees by allying with Forestry or some other group against CSEA; (2) CSPRA could not try and win sole representation, but remain an employee group by giving up payroll deduction; (3) CSPRA can become a "straight" professional organization and refer any matters of "wages, hours, and conditions of employment" to CSEA. The choices look pretty grim on initial observation. However, a choice with some comprises is obvious to me and may actually bind our organization closer than ever before.

The choice is this. Let's give up our formal employee representation status and support CSEA in its representation plan. We would than

be a professional organization and be able to continue payroll deduction, and we will also have made a friend of CSEA. It is my opinion that they will win representation anyway, so a battle against CSEA would prove nothing and alienate an organization whose aid we need. CSPRA could still make recommendations to CSEA on employee wage/hours matters. but could devote the bulk of its time to professional matters, not the least of which could be a stronger role in park and environmental protection. We were weakened by diversion of our efforts to employee working conditions rather than the long term environmental goals which ultimately are so important. Now, with care in the coming months, we can come out a stronger, unified, viable organization dedicated to professionalism in every sense of the word. Maybe we actually can have our cake and eat it. too?

WEATHER GAUGES

Many of the State Parks have weather gauges so they can cooperate with the weather service and Department of Water Resources recording intensity and amounts of precipitation for forecasting weather and river stage flood warnings. Somehow Castle Crags used to have two. Both were on the same location. One for Department of Water Resources and one for the U. S. Weather Service. This yarn is about how Department of Water Resources lost theirs.

Department of Water Resources' gauge was located near the office about 75 yards downhill from the residence of the ranger in charge. One day while Joe was home for lunch he noticed a State car drive up and two men get out to do maintenance work on the gauge. All went well until Joe watched one of them open the trunk of the car, get out an axe and start chopping down a ten foot high young pine tree.

Ranger Joe was 6'4" - 180 lbs. of muscle and excitable. He'd planted those trees. He was proud of his success. The trees were growing beautifully, even though they had been planted in the tailing dump of an old chrome mill. Not the best soil for growing anything.

Joe jumped up from the table and headed downhill to save his trees. He must have made a rather frightening sight as his long legs covered the ground while a sputtering roar came out of his mouth. He sometime stuttered when excited.

He was too late to save the tree, but he grabbed the axe, and tossed it over the car. The startled Department of Water Resources' man tried to explain he'd chopped down the tree because it was shading the thermometer on the weather gauge. Joe wasn't willing to listen. He told the Department of Water Resources' men where they could shove their gauge. He was ready to help them. Rather than argue with a big wild ranger they put the whole gauge in the car and got out of the park while they were still in one piece.

When Joe called District Headquarters he was still stuttering so much it was hard to understand his problem. He finally cooled down a little when his boss, Hank, told him that Department of Water Resources would never put their gauge back.

Nobody likes to lose a good weather reporting station. The guy who chopped down the tree got chewed out by his boss. Next day Department of Water Resources' Headquarters called and the guilty man's boss tried to talk Hank into letting them reinstall the gauge.

No way said Hank. You can get your information from the U. S. Weather Bureau down the hall. Department of Water Resources gave up when Hank informed them their man was lucky Joe didn't throw the guy in jail for chopping down a tree in a State Park.

Department of Water Resources wrote apologetic letters to Department of Parks and Recreation Sacramento Headquarters, but they never did get their gauge back in Castle Crags State Park.

WHEREAS, the only state park employees currently allowed to participate as active members of CSPRA are maintenance employees, Park Managers and State Park Rangers.

WHEREAS, several other field positions require uniformed personnel who perform field duties including interpretation of park resources and public contact.

WHEREAS the new Employees Relation Act may change the ways which CSPRA can represent its membership.

WHEREAS it would be beneficial to the organization to include as active members other field positions which have public contact responsibilities.

NOW THEREFORE be it resolved that the constitution and bylaws be amended so that active membership in CSPRA is extended to include personnel who are working or have worked in the following classifications: State Park Naturalist, State Park Historians, State Park Archeologist and State Park Guide.
