#### CALIFORNIA HISTORY: SUGGESTED BIBLIOGRAPHY

This bibliography is designed to familiarize park personnel with titles of books concerning various aspects of California's history. In this bibliography I have chosen to omit the publisher, date of publication, and location in order to save space and to present the reader of this publication with the bare essentials necessary to launch into their local library, searching for topics or titles of greatest interest to them.

Historians as well as students of California history will notice I have not included such works as Bancroft's seven volume <u>History of California</u>, or Bolton's five volume <u>Anza's California Expeditions</u>, as well as other recognized, authoritative, and voluminous works regarding California's past. I have done so in order to give readers the most accessible and readily readable sources of information regarding this golden state.

Publications by local historical societies and/or local historians can be very useful and interesting sources of information as they pertain to particular parks and geographic areas. Historical publications are also good sources of the most current research going on within the state. The Public Historian, The Pacific Historian, The Californians, California Historical Society Quarterly, among others, can be found on the shelves of the local library, and would make good additions to any park's interpretive or research library.

Once again this bibliography is not exhaustive, but it is hoped other readers will add to and embellish the list with their own selections. For those readers who are unfamiliar with the myriad aspects of California's history it is hoped this list will offer some guidelines, direction, and inspiration to seek out, internalize, understand, appreciate, and interpret the human history of California.

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# Environmental Symposium

On January 26 and 27 1985 the Planning and Conservation League, one of California's most effective environmental lobbying organizations, will sponsor the Second California Environmental Legislative Symposium at the Sacramento Inn. The Inn is located near Cal Expo, about ten minutes from downtown Sacramento.

The purpose of the Symposium will be to plan environmental legislation to be introduced early in the upcoming two year legislative session, as well as to plan strategy for opposing legislation that would be dangerous and harmful to the environment in California. Individual workshops wil be held on such topics as water development, pesticides, toxic materials, wildlife, renewable resources, new techniques in grass roots environmental lobbying, and several others. The cost to attend the two day symposium is \$50.00 per person and includes three meals.

Last year PCL sponsored a similar event in Sacramento which was attended by representatives from environmental organizations, legislators, and legislative staff, members of the Local Government Commission, and representatives from state agencies. The upcoming symposium will be greatly expanded to include the public at large, and an even greater number of California's environmental activists.

PCL is a nonprofit statewide environmental organization, devoted to improving the quality of the environment in California. PCL has been lobbying at the Capitol since 1965 and currently has over 3000 members.

PCL recently secured a commitment from Mayor Tom Bradley to be a special guest speaker at the symposium on Saturday January 26th. 



#### Sonoma Resources



The "Parks and Natural Resources" study track in the School of Environmental Studies and Planning at Sonoma State University has a common core of courses dealing with planning, energy, and biophysical and social environmental knowledge. A wide array of support courses permit a prospective state park employee to specialize in interpretation, management, or enforcement. Many of Sonoma's graduates have positions at county and state parks, or work in related areas such as Outdoor Education, Watershed Management, Open Space, and in areas of water quality studies.

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

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# Park Lawnmowers

In September 1984, CSPRA President Price wrote State Parks Director William Briner expressing CSPRA opposition to commercial exploitation of State Park System resources by commercial livestock grazing. Livestock grazing on a commercial scale is a potential threat to Henry Coe, Mt. Diablo, and other state park units.

President Price wrote, "The adverse effects of grazing on natural ecosystems has been well documented. Grazing damages riparian systems, reduces oak regeneration, pollutes water, and promotes proliferation of thistles and other exotic plant species. The barbed wire fences, which are necessary parts of livestock operations, mar park scenery and are hazards to park visitors." Price urged Director Briner to, "take a big step toward protecting State Park System resources and maintaining opportunities for high quality visitor experiences by adopting a Department policy prohibiting commercial livestock grazing."
