She was devoted to her husband and children, William Penn Mott III of Ross, California; John David Mott of Santa Cruz; and the late Nancy Mott Pichler.

24 Alternative Uses For The PR 24

The PR 24. It sits in your car, hangs at your side or is resting comfortably at home beside your off-season stetson. If you're in the Southern Region or other high enforcement area, you may even use it once in awhile for its intended purpose.

If, however, you find your PR 24 is still a shiny, fresh-out-of-the-box black, void of dings and scratches and just lies around somewhere feeling lonely and depressed, we at the Gaviota District say . . . USE IT!

During a recent training session, our DT instructor, who shall remain nameless, introduced 24 alternative uses for this fine instrument of defense. We would like to share these here with you. (Note: The following has <u>not</u> been approved by DPR.

- 1. Snake Attention Getter: Pound on the ground to scare away snakes lurking near you.
- **2. Trail Hook:** Brush away the poison oak from that overgrown trail.
- **3. Fly Swatter:** For advanced fly swatters or extremely obnoxious flies or for when you are **really** bored and need a challenge.
- **4. Mother Nature's Helper:** Knock the tops off thistles to help distribute the seeds.
- **5. Injured Animal Destroyer:** Put sea gulls or cute little squirrels out of their misery when injured beyond repair.
- **6. Mudpuddle Depth Tester:** Test depth of puddles **before** getting your boots muddy. We have found that "Sole High," "Toe High" and "In The Boot" notches placed discreetly on the baton are quite helpful for this.
- 7. Mud Knocker Offer: Knock off the mud

(and other squishy items) that can accumulate on one's boots.

- **8. Cobweb Destroyer:** Knock down those unsightly cobwebs in the corner of the office.
- **9. Commode Clearer:** Clear out stopped up toilets (at least temporarily).
- **10. PMA's Friend:** Use to really jam that diaper down the toilet so a PMA can earn a little extra money in overtime. (Only do it at PMAs end of shift and with his/her permission or this turns into the PMA's enemy).
- 11. **Dog Distractor Stick:** Throw to dogs to keep them from attacking you. Most dogs will chase sticks, if you're lucky. (Known as "Distract" in PR 24 jargon).
- **12. Dog Annihilator Stick:** Borrow your partner's to throw at or hit the attacking dog if you are not lucky (known as "strike" in PR 24 Jargon).
- 13. Dog Teach-it-a-Lesson Stick: Pretend you are throwing it for the dog and, as soon as it turns its back to run after it, teach it a lesson it will not soon forget by giving the beast a quick but very effective wack on its you know what (known as "Distract and Strike").
- **14. Gavel:** Used to get screamers, arguers, or deadhead's attention during enforcement contacts.
- **15. Crutch:** Use as a crutch/support when going down an extremely steep trail.
- **16. Crutch:** Use as a crutch if you break both legs beneath the knees.
- **17. Crutch:** Use as a crutch if you've had an especially long shift that day.
- **18. Brake Light Tester:** Jam it in the brake pedal to check the brake lights during monthly inspections. (Continued on page 7)
